A BOOK

"Ed," Ann began, "I've just found a book that awes me!"

"Oh, and haven't shared it with me, eh?" Ed chuckled.

"No," Ann smiled, "and I will tell you why. It is both deep and clear. I did not want to bother you with anything that I myself was not completely sure about. Yet this book seems to contain wonderful things about the Bible that I never heard of before."

"Like what?"

"Well, you know how my minister, Reverend Smith, quotes St. Paul so much. He seems to love the New Testament generally - Paul's writings specifically. I believe that if Reverend Smith were to meet St. Paul on a city street, he would actually embrace him!"

"Yes, I have observed that. And I guess all his congregation, also, is aware of it. Of course, you are not suggesting that he is placing Paul above Christ!"

"Oh, no, Ed! But I was just thinking how the minister of your church, Reverend Brown, seems to exalt the Apostle Peter next to Christ."

"Well, what has that to do with the book you are starting to read, Ann?"

NOT OBSOLETE

"Ed, I almost hate to say this, but this book makes clear that the Apostle Paul said the 'obsolete' Old Testament, as we have heard it referred to, is not really obsolete at all."

"Ann, but we have heard it called the 'Old Bible' as contrasted with the New Testament. Isn't that right?"

"Yes. But I doubt it is true, Ed - not according to the book I am reading. The author of this book seems to exalt the writings of both St. Paul and St. Peter. But then he quotes both of them as stating that the Old Testament was actually written with our very day in mind: in fact, for our development of Christian character. So that makes it up-to-date."

"I never heard this before, Ann. Where do you find Paul or Peter making such a statement? Did you know, Ann, that if this were true, it would change our whole religious thinking?"

IT CAN SOLVE PROBLEMS

"Yes, Ed, and that is why I've been slow to share the book with you until I am absolutely sure that its teaching regarding prayer is Scriptural. If it is, Ed, then you and I have the basis for solving every problem of life. And so do our friends, Mike and Ruth, down the street."

"Careful now, Ed. The book is not belittling professional counseling. But it is dealing with a basis for solving problems."

FOR OUR DAY

"And what about Paul and Peter, Ann?"

"Well, St. Paul said that things written in the Old Testament were actually written for us today. He wrote: 'For whatsoever things were written aforetime were written for our learning.' And he is referring to the Holy Scriptures of the Old Testament; for he continues by saying, 'that we through patience and comfort of the scriptures might have hope.' That is found in Romans 15:4."

"Well, Ann, we surely need hope and comfort in these days when the first cause of death among our youth is suicide. Everywhere we turn we find riots, rape, murder, and destruction. Someone said the

other day that millions of people in the world are actually starving right now! Anything that claims to teach us how to find comfort and hope in these dark days is worth looking into. But what about Peter, Ann?"

"Ed, the statement by the Apostle Peter is even more amazing to me. He stated that the Old Testament writers were informed at the time of their writing that their messages were not nearly so much for them as for us. He speaks of the Old Testament prophets and the salvation they presented. Then he adds: 'Unto whom it was revealed, that not unto themselves, but unto us they did minister.' That is found in the First Epistle of Peter, chapter one, verses ten to twelve."

FOR END OF WORLD

Ann continued, "And, Ed, Paul makes a sweeping statement in 1 Corinthians 10:11, when he says: 'Now all these things happened unto them for ensamples: and they are written for our admonition, upon whom the ends of the world are come.' "

"Well, Ann, that fits our day. Our wisest men are now telling us that the world can't last many more years. They say the end is almost here.

"But, Ann, don't Paul and Peter mean that the Old Testament prophecies are about our Lord's life and death, and they teach lessons we should learn?"

"Yes, Ed, the book underscores this vital feature of the Old Testament. But it states that there are truths in the Old Testament, also, that we have not understood. These have to do with the basis of a different kind of prayer-one that claims Bible promises."

The book claims that the Old Testament also teaches that He already existed in Old Testament times. And, in fact, He is the One who made the world in the beginning of time. "And where did the book get that idea from, Ann? I never once heard of any such Scripture. I think I see now why you have been slow to share the contents of this book with me. I would hesitate to acknowledge that Christ existed in Old Testament times - and of all things, not as the Creator of the world, Ann!"

"Ed, that is just what I had thought, too, until I read the book. But here are some of the passages of Scripture the book quotes. Suppose

CREATOR OF THE WORLD

"Ed, if the book quotes the Bible correctly, then there are many texts that state that Christ made the world. Now if you will turn to the Bible again, and do some more checking, we will see if the Bible is correctly quoted. Here are two or three texts."

"OK, Ann. Shoot!"

"The first text comes from my pastor's favorite Bible hero, St. Paul. In Hebrews 1:1 and 2 he wrote: 'God, who at sundry times and in divers manners spake in time past unto the fathers by the prophets, hath in these last days spoken unto us by his Son, whom he hath appointed heir of all things, by whom also he made the worlds.' "

"You don't mean it, Ann! Let me see if that is actually what the Bible says." Ed finally located the text. "Yes, Ann, that is exactly what it says."

"And here is another, Ed, from St. Paul, too. Listen to this one.
